As we enter a new year, the world continues to face great challenges, particularly the economy. The call for greater productivity is clear, and security departments and providers need to stay current to be competitive.

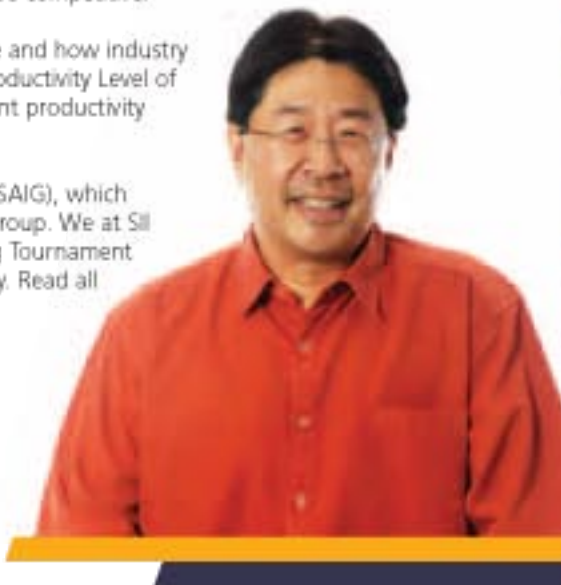

All in all, the afternoon was a roaring success for all involved, from organisers to participants, strengthening the bonds of friendship and camaraderie, and providing a much-deserved outlet for fun and enjoyment.

Today's volatile economic climate poses new challenges to corporations. Just as other business departments are seeing the necessity of improving their productivity to contribute to the company's growth, security departments too have to play their part, using resources more efficiently, streamlining work processes, improving quality and training methods.



Recognising the needs of today's business environment, the Security Industry Institute organised the Security Industry Conference 2011 themed "Enhancing the Productivity Level of the Security Industry in Singapore". The conference provided the latest knowledge on security productivity, and offered participants the perfect platform to network and share information on best practices for security productivity.

For many participants, the highlights of the conference were the talks by the guest speakers, each of whom offered key insights and concrete case studies on improving productivity in security. ## Redefining the role of the security department

### THE ESSENTIAL COMPONENTS OF TRULY PRODUCTIVE SECURITY

Keynote speaker: Dr Martin Gill  
Director, Perpetuity Research & Consultancy International (PRCI)

**I**n his talk, Dr Gill defined what he sees as a stumbling block to changing the perception of security, as well as the principal party responsible for that perception, security itself.

He believes that security departments need to develop strategies that integrate with the business goals of the company. To do that, security heads must begin to think more as business people, just as intent on improving the company's bottom line as the heads of other departments, from marketing to finance. A sound security strategy helps demonstrate how security adds value to the business.

Dr Gill emphasised that a security strategy has to reflect reality, "This is about having a strategy, making it meaningful and building it into the working lives of the people."

Developing a strategy and solutions with the operations of the whole organisation in mind would make security easy for the staff and difficult for the potential offender, and go a long way to making security a key player in the organisation.

In his talk he spoke on how to make the optimum use of security with thorough training and productivity, while keeping the morale of security officers up. He also spoke about differentiating the roles of in-house security officers according to functions and responsibilities, and how to outsource effectively.



### TERRORIST BUS BOMBING IN MANILA

**T**he start of the decade showed us that the age of terrorism is still with us, with a bus bomb explosion that happened in Philippines' Makati City in January 2011, causing 4 deaths and 20 wounded.

Mr Capacete broke down the facts of this terrorist incident and examined what was done right and what could have been handled better. He analysed how security productivity can be used as a preventative measure to alleviate similar future threats.

# Security Training Programmes

The Security Industry Institute was jointly established in September 2007 by Temasek Polytechnic (TP) and Singapore Workforce Development Agency (WDA) as the Continuing Education and Training (CET) centre for Security Industry to offer professional Security Workforce Skills Qualification (WSQ) training and quality placement services for security personnel.

## Certificate in Security Operations

### Programme

Competencies in this qualification equip the security officer with basic and specialised skills to enhance work performance. Individual has to complete 6 modules (3 core and 3 electives) for full qualification.

### Core Modules

- Handle security incidents and services\*
- Provide guard and patrol services\*
- Handle counter-terrorism activities

### Elective Modules

- Assist in evacuation of premises
- Manage disorderly conduct and threatening behaviour
- Conduct crowd and traffic control
- Perform access control and alarm incident management
- Provide people protection services
- Perform covert retail security
- Minimise retail theft and loss
- Provide mobile patrol services
- Perform security operations within legal framework

## Advanced Certificate in Security Supervision

### Programme

Competencies in this qualification equip personnel with supervisory skills to manage and facilitate the work for a team of security officers. Individual has to complete 7 modules (4 core and 3 electives) for full qualification.

### Core Modules

- Supervise security officers\*
- Assess and address security risks
- Perform supervisory duties within legal framework
- Induct security personnel

### Elective Modules

- Conduct operation briefing and debriefing
- Operate security equipment
- Contribute to the management of security incidents
- Monitor and review security operations
- Lead and manage a team of security officers

## Diploma in Security Management

### Programme

Competencies in this qualification equip personnel with managerial skills to perform the jobs at managerial level and manage the security operations, agency or department. Individual has to complete 8 modules (5 core and 3 electives) for full qualification.

- Conduct security survey
- Manage security operations
- Plan and develop security risk control measures
- Manage security agency within legal framework
- Manage security risk control measures

### Elective Modules

- Develop a security manpower deployment plan
- Prepare & submit tender for security services
- Achieve work effectiveness in security environment

- Manage performance of security personnel
- Manage security business
- Manage security emergencies
