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ECURITY ON OT WHEELS:

SEGWAY PERSONAL TRANSPORTERS LEAD THE WAY

CAMPUS SECURITY

Donald Thaver (ICPS-Security) holds the position of Assistant Head of Security Operations at Temasek Polytechnic (TP). Having turned 70 earlier this year, Donald has one thing in common with the body of lively, energetic students in the institution. Like them, he is still on a journey to learn.

Donald has been in the security industry for nearly 30 years, and has been involved with campus security for most of his career. Transitioning from Ngee Ann Polytechnic to Singapore Polytechnic, he eventually landed in Temasek Polytechnic after a chance meeting with the school's founding principal, Dr Varaprasad, nearly 20 years ago.

Back then, the face of security was beginning to evolve and the industry needed people equipped with knowledge in technology. "Dr Varaprasad asked me if I knew how to operate a computer and I said 'no'. But, I was willing to learn," says Donald.

At 50 years old, most of his surrounding peers were beginning to take a step back with their careers. Instead, he began leaping forward by attending computer workshops and a slew of other courses. His cubicle walls are now adorned with framed certificates- a testament to his approach towards lifelong learning. Donald, who knew absolutely nothing about computers when he started, has even self-taught himself to do basic coding and programming for security software at his workplace.

It all came out after the age of 50. It's not true when people say 50 is too late to learn. I'm still learning. I'm enthusiastic about learning. I took the trouble to learn and knew nuts about the computer when I came. When I came to TP, I grew to love and enjoy what I did.

A typical day for Donald means arriving at campus at 7am where the morning quiet gives him time to be with himself. He replies to emails and later checks on security staff for absentees. As the Assistant Head of Security, Donald manages and guides the security officers in the campus. But his influence and presence extend beyond the department he handles; also playing the role of a mentor to the students, students come to him for help and advice which Donald says he greatly welcomes. "I love being here because it means working with kids whom I treat like my own. I'm not a trained counselor, but I try to educate them on the niceties of life. I'm basically a father or grandfather to these children."

Nearly two decades into his job, Donald still treats each day as a challenge and approaches them with the same spirit. With thousands of students, staff and guests in the campus constantly on the move, it is up to Donald and his men to anticipate their intent. One way he does so is through predictive profiling, a method of threat assessment based on a observing a person's body language, behavior or situation. Donald finds the subject fascinating and enthuses about using it.

is that security also entails service. Whether in a campus or in any other organisation for that matter, part and parcel of being a security officer is about upholding or enhancing the level of customer satisfaction. These behind-the-scenes work make security a multi-faceted job, and one which Donald has adapted to and grown to love. He stresses that while procedures and protocols are indispensable to being a good security officer, the key to being a great one ultimately hinges on having the right attitude.

This is what it's about when you're in a job. The people who encouraged and talked to me told me that if security was what I wanted to do, do it and be the best. It's about your attitude. If your attitude is wrong, you can forget about any job. You must have the inclination to learn and want to be better.

Donald enjoys what he does now, but his sentiments were to an organisation's safety. It can be different in the beginning. If you look harder, you might realise that he was the lanky lead guitarist for acclaimed local 60s band 'Sonny Bala & The Moonglows'. When he went into the security line, the job was purely a means to an end for his young family which needed supporting. Going in with eyes wide open, he saw many things wrong with the industryone of which was realising that security officers were not

Another aspect of security which many may not know about Over the years, he has tried to change the concept of security, but recognises the preconceived notion is hard to shake. However, he admits the way security is perceived has also much to do with the people within the industry itself. "The fault doesn't lie entirely on the other side," he says. Explaining that most security personnel themselves give off the impression that their job is not one to be taken seriously. he says there is little wonder why the officers have such a bad name. Donald also mentions the need for security companies to be regulated for staff poaching and standards must be set in terms of picking the right person for the job.

> If you are looking at security as a whole and if you want to further the industry, I think these matters must be looked at in a different light. Security has quite a way to go before it reaches the stage where people will say yes, we need security and acknowledge that our guys are crucial done but will take some time, he says.
