MENDAKI Learning Festival 2012

P articipants from all walks of life were invited to join the MENDAKI Learning Festival 2012, which took place at the Singapore Expo Hall 5B from 15 to 17 June 2012. The festival was part of MENDAKI Social Enterprise Network Singapore Pte Ltd (SENSE), a business arm of Yayasan MENDAKI that enhances the competitiveness and confidence of both students and workers through training, career services and education services.

The objective of the festival was not only to celebrate MENDAKI's 30th anniversary, but also to encourage the public to reach for new heights and ambitions in the community with the slogan, "Wonder. Discover. Aspire". In addition to seminars, try-out skills sessions, live shows, booths from training institutions offering training courses in various industries were set up to share the benefits of skills upgrading and lifelong learning. Never the one to shy away in aiding such a good cause, the Security Industry Institute (SII) was one of the participating training institutions in the Mendaki Learning Festival 2012 and provided visitors with information on their WSQ Security courses, as well as career services to the participants seeking a job position in the security industry.

M.I.C.E. Security



C ontrary to what most people think, a day in the life of a Meetings Incentives Conferences Exhibitions (MICE) security officer is hardly similar to a security officer working in a shopping mall. Not only are they distinct in terms of work environment, their scope of responsibilities and duties differ as well, as what Mr Tan Jeck Jong, Assistant Security Supervisor at Suntec Singapore International Convention & Exhibition Services Pte Ltd (SSICES) has learnt in his 17 years of working at SSICES.

As Assistant Security Supervisor, he has to assist the Team Supervisor in managing the security officers, conducting operation briefings, ensuring the security of the building, the safety of clients and the delegates participating in the events, especially in cases of emergency or when the need arises.

Mr Tan will usually kick start his day with a team briefing session whereby he will allocate work and brief his team members on the current or upcoming events for their preparation. This is all done before work officially starts at 9am and that is when he will oversee the daily operations of his team.

Mr Tan also noted that MICE security can be more challenging as compared to other types of security; as convention centres such as Suntec Convention Centre, Marina Bay Sands, Singapore Expo and the Singapore Conference Hall usually hold many international conferences and exhibitions that involve delegates from all over the world.

"Security job can be both physically and mentally demanding," Mr Tan acknowledged that he and his colleagues must always be on high alert in case of unforeseen situations and emergencies. There are many ways to be vigilant on the job. One of which is to attend upgrading courses such as the ones offered by the Security Industry Institute (SII) which better prepares him for the various security incidents on the ground.

"We need to advance our skills from time to time through courses that can help us to be more equipped. That way we gain more knowledge and are able to handle any emergency situations" said Mr Tan.

Even with the long gruelling working hours involved with MICE security, work is done out of sheer responsibility and pure passion. Mr Boey Zakaria, Head of Department for the Security and Fire Safety Department, certainly agreed to that.

Coming from a uniform background and having served his National Service, Mr Boey Zakaria realised that contributing to the nation's security was his calling and thus became his passion, which led him to choose a career in MICE security.

A typical day for him goes like this: He clocks in and starts checking in with the night shift supervisor for any night occurrences. Next, he conducts briefing with the morning shift officers and proceeds to administrative work. If there is a mega event, he is also responsible for drawing out a detailed preparation plan, in which he may need to request police officers on stand-by or security agencies to provide more back-up manpower, depending on the situation. When the convention centre plays host to larger scale events, such as the COMEX Show and the IT Show, it is common to have more than 100 security officers on duty to ensure security of the area and for better crowd control.

Leading a team of security officers Mr Boey Zakaria understands the importance of advancing his knowledge and skills as it helps him to do his job better, especially since the security function is an integral part of Suntec's corporate values.

"Anyone can become a MICE security officer. However, he must have the drive as well as willingness to meet and serve people from all walks of life as MICE security officers need to be customer-oriented to handle different types of event ranging from corporate meetings to media launches to national events," Mr Boey Zakaria advised those who are interested in getting into the field of MICE security. "Most importantly, a good security officer must have passion in what he/she is doing," he added.
